Last month also, AMS president, Ron Cook, conducted a survey among college students which showed that some two hundred and thirty would like to return to Victoria College for third year.

We thank Dr. Hickman, Mr. Cook and all others who are campaigning on our behalf for a third year. We now ask government officials who are concerned with education to give our desires most serious consideration and to act. Please—we'd consider it a great honor to hold the degree: Bachelor of Arts—Victoria College.

THE VICE-PRINCIPAL REPORTS

September 1959 may well turn out to be one of the most significant dates in the history of Victoria College, and our present students will be the first beneficiaries of the development at that time. It is most probable that an offering of third and fourth year courses, leading to majors in several fields, will be given in the academic year 1959-60. If this is to take place, it is essential that the needs and interests of our present second year students be made known, and I would like to congratulate the Students' Council for its initiative and leadership in circulating a questionnaire in this connection. The members of our student body should realize. this connection. The members of our student body should realize, however, that during the past two summer sessions and evening division offerings, Victoria College has registered more than 750 students in various third and fourth year courses, and also, during the present session, there are six courses carrying upper year credit and attended by 175 students being given during the evenings and Saturday mornings.

One of the problems involved in preparing to offer work beyond the second year has to do with library facilities, and the college is proud of the progress being made in trying to solve this difficulty. During the past five years, the number of volumes in our library has grown from roughly 10,000 to 52,000, and our professional library staff has increased from one to four. This, of course, is just a beginning, and a tremendous amount remains to be done. We have hardly begun to purchase the back numbers of many periodicals, and our book stock still has many gaps.

I would like to suggest to our students and to the people in the homes from which they came that there are many books and periodicals in home libraries which are frequently sold or destroyed because their potential value is unknown. Our librarian would appreciate an opportunity of viewing such books before they are disposed of. I look forward to the day when Victoria College will be serving a larger community by giving upper year courses on our campus. I would like to pay tribute at this time to the citizens of this area who, since 1903, have supported in every possible way the growth and development of Victoria College, and I hope that we will be able to continue to serve these citizens as we grow and develop during the next few years.
