'Full Speed Ahead' For Quad Face-Lift

The University of Victoria has taken the first steps towards developing the heart of its Gordon Head campus.

President Malcolm G. Taylor announced that a contract in the amount of \$188,800 has been signed with Farmer Construction Limited of Victoria, for basic landscaping of the university's central quadrangle and construction of walks. Deadline for completion is early in September, before the start of the fall term.

'In the Rough'

The eight-acre "quad" has been left in the rough while new buildings rose around it. Latest additions to the Gordon Head scene, the Social Sciences Complex and the Arts-Education Building, open their doors to students for the first time this fall. They join the Clearihue Building, the McPherson Library, and the Elliott Science Building within the University core, a circular area 2,000 feet in diameter designed for pedestrians only.

The quad will be 900 feet long and 400 feet wide, including the surrounding concrete

walkways. The contract covers installation of lighting and drainage, and restoration of the land's natural contours, ready for grassing-in and the planting of shade trees.

Decision Sought

One corner of the quad's broad expanse is chopped by Finnerty Road, which is still open to through traffic. If current talks with the municipalities of Oak Bay and Saanich lead to closure of the road within the circle, the roadbed

will be included in this summer's landscaping.

R. W. Siddall, the University's architectural consultant said completion of the quad will link existing buildings together in visual terms, and in physical terms for students walking from class to class.

"Now all the elements are there," Mr. Siddall said. "We look forward to moving the construction site out of the centre of the campus, to clear the way for the beautiful setting that was planned."

Summer plays Star students

There's a good time ahead for Victoria this summer as the University Summer Theatre Division gets set to present two full-scale productions.

Both the McPherson Playhouse and the University's own Phoenix Theatre will play host

to performances starring campus actors and students taking a new non-credit summer theatre course.

First Big Step

It will be the University's first major venture in the McPherson Playhouse.

Billed for Aug. 8th to 13th at the McPherson is "Time Remembered," a romantic comedy by Jean Anouilh and directed by Carl Hare.

Styles Lamponed

Complete with a carefully designed set of French Provincial-type furnishings and an off-the-cuff designed costume wardrobe lamponing French vogue styles, the comedy cast includes Harry Hill, Margaret Dixon, Bruce Sharp, Gudrun Lankild-Lauesen, Dick Chudley and Michael Micklejohn.

Meanwhile students of the Summer Theatre work-shop, who chose to enrol in one or three of the sections of the complete \$60 non-credit course, will be hard at work on their production, "A State of Siege."

Proving Ground

Written by Albert Camus and directed by Robert Hedley, the play will not only be the proving ground for both high school students and other theatre enthusiasts set on learning stage basics, but also a challenge to its audience, involving a subtle study in human values.

A team of four professionals will coach the students in all phases of theatre, including stagecraft principles and techniques, costume design, acting, and speech.

Scholarships

This year the University has provided 20 scholarships for groups such as these with students in grades 11 and 12. Their "State of Siege" production, slated for Aug. 15 to 20, will charge a nominal admission fee to perpetuate these scholarships.

On the lighter side of history, an unusual exhibition of printing in British Columbia will be displayed in the McPherson Library in mid-July.

To complete the Centennial events, writer-historian James Nesbitt invites you to take a tour with him of Victoria's historical sites and buildings.

Transportation and refreshments will cost \$2.50 (students \$1.50) and tickets are available from the Summer Session office in the S.U.B.

Reservations will be accepted up to July 25th while the tour itself is tentatively set for Saturday afternoon, July 30th.

Bigsby Greets Students

Student council president Stephen Bigsby Monday welcomed summer students thus:

"On behalf of the Alma Mater Society of the University of Victoria I would like to welcome you to the 1966 Summer Session.

"Because the summer session at any University is a period of concentrated academic effort, the program of student activities is necessarily limited. Many of you are registered in the Faculty of Education, teachers who will be working to complete degrees or obtain a more advanced level of certification.

"Others are students completing their degree requirements, or those who, despite the Senate's excellent decision to liberalize compulsory course requirements, are taking courses they have attempted before.

"The Alma Mater Society, in recognition of the rapid expansion of the Summer Session enrollment, is dividing the revenues from the \$2 Student Union Fee between the Dr. Ewing Memorial Trust Fund for Student Union Building expansion, and the actual operating cost of the building. In addition, a portion of the monies will be used for the first time to subsidize the program of the social committee of the Activities Council, which is designed to enable Summer Session students to become better acquainted with one another early in the term.

"To this end, I would encourage all students to participate in the Welcoming Program during the first week of lectures, and extend our invitation to attend the summer dance which will mark the official end of Summer Session.

"This Summer Session, with approximately 1000 students enrolled, is a prophesy of their tremendous pressures that will be felt by Canadian Universities this fall. The completion of the new Social Sciences and Education-Arts buildings, the move from Lansdowne Campus, the introduction of the College System and construction of a Stadium, the expansion of the Student Union Building — all reflect the fantastic growth that this University shares with other institutions across the continent.

"In general, all student programs in the process of organization for next year stress participation over profit and activity rather than observation. The downstairs area of the SUB is being converted to cafeteria and Publications are taking over the Health Services Building. The SUB Expansion Program is in its final stages of preparation.

Garvie Appointed

Fine Arts Chief Named

Peter Garvie, 39, program director of the English networks of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, has been appointed director of the new School of Fine Arts at the University of Victoria.

Mr. Garvie, now at CBC production headquarters in Toronto takes up his academic duties Aug. 1. His first task will be to complete preparations for new programs offered at Victoria this fall to students seeking a Fine Arts degree in art, theatre or music.

New Specialties

Courses in fine arts were previously given by various departments of the faculty of arts and science and the faculty of education. Students may now specialize in these activities, and work towards the degree of bachelor of fine arts (B.F.A.) or bachelor of music (B.Mus.).

Announcing the appointment, President Malcolm Taylor said: "The University is most fortunate to have a director with such a broad range of experience for this undertaking. Mr. Garvie has an excellent reputation as a dramatic poet and critic of the arts."

Remodelling Scheme Requires 'Pubs' Shift

Officials hope to get started "within a month" on remodelling of the basement of the Student Union Building.

Plans call for the moving of The Martlet, radio society, and minor publication offices to the old Health Services Building located north of the SUB.

The 2,600-square-foot area now occupied by offices will be turned into cafeteria space to accommodate about 200 more students.

We'd like to get started within a month in order to have the cafeteria ready for September," bearded SUB director Rick Kurtz says. No estimates have been made for the cost of the changes, but Kurtz feels that the expense won't run too high.

Vending machines will be installed in the new eating area.

Martlet editor Ted Pulford approved the move to the Health Services building. But Pulford wants a little space for The Martlet in the SUB to maintain contact with the student body.

The Health Services building offers about 1,000 square feet of office space upstairs. This includes a kitchen which may be retained if publications and radio officials wish. The building also has its own parking lot.

Poster facilities and a darkroom will be housed in the basement with the publications and the radio society sharing the upstairs area.

Rare Skill

"As an administrator, he is noted for his energy and initiative. As a producer, he has displayed rare skill in drawing together the most diverse products of the imagination and making them meaningful to a national audience."

Mr. Garvie was born in London, England, and is a graduate of Cambridge University. He came to Canada in 1948, after receiving his B.A. with honors in English and law, and joined the CBC as news editor. He turned to production in 1952, and from 1958 until last fall held the positions of director of radio and supervisor of public affairs at the CBC's regional office in Vancouver.

During 18 years with the CBC, Mr. Garvie has been associated with a wide variety of programming, as writer and planner. He has written eight radio plays, and contributes short stories and poetry to Canadian magazines and CBC anthology programs.

Diversified Duties

While he was in Vancouver, he supervised the production of many plays and concerts, as well as documentaries of all kinds on the Canadian scene. He created the television-magazine "Seven O'Clock Show" and organized and edited "CBC Saturday Evening," a radio anthology of the arts. His many other projects include the development of the series of lectures, dramas and features that celebrated the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's birth in 1964.

The president, deans of Arts & Science and Administration, and the Bursar's Offices will remain at Lansdowne until September.

Please read the following information carefully.

Parking: Parking regulations are the same as for the winter session, all parking within the ring road is reserved and is patrolled. Tickets will be issued to parking offenders.

Cafeterias: The main Cafeteria is open from 7:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on weekdays and from 11:30 to 6:00 p.m. on Sundays. The Student Union Building Coffee Shop is open from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., Monday to Friday.

Bookstore: The Bookstore is located in the new Campus Services Building across Finnerty Road from The S.U.B. and will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday to Friday.

Mail: Student Mail Boxes are located in the foyer of the S.U.B. Student Union Building; The S.U.B. will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. Monday to Friday. For use of facilities and reservations please apply at the S.U.B. office.
